





Aunty Beth shared knowledge about many elements of Wayilwan heritage, including:

- · native birds, which assisted the Wayilwan ancestors to employ sustainable river and land management practices, about family through music and language.
- · the importance of reason and purpose to inform our decision making when we think, talk and act for sustainability, spirituality and respect,
- · the name behind johnny cakes and how this reflects Australia's history,
- · how to make johnny cakes and why they were made this Graham and Be then workshopped with way in the past and
- · how to create Wayilwan Country inspired earrings, inclusive of emu feathers and quandong seeds. This type of jewellery sells on the commercial market for up to \$40!

Leadership Development

was pleased to facilitate its first Aboriginal students' leadership camp for students in Years 9 and 10. The first day was a visit to the Warrumbungles National Park Environmental Education Centre (WNPEEC). The Warrumbungles were an important boundary and trading place for the Wayilwan, Gamilaraay and Wiradjuri Nations. The second day was spent in the Pilliga Scrub, discovering the significance of the sandstone caves and sculptures in the scrub. A night time pottery workshop at Pilliga Pottery was a wonderful wellbeing activity for the students. Students through experiential activities learned how important connections to Country are. Most

importantly the students learned how to develop their critical thinking skills, how to question and analyse.

A special thanks to both Mrs Harries and Mr Armstrong who drove students to the event.


Year 6






